Problem

Turkey hosts the largest refugee population in the world. Most of these refugees are from

neighboring war-torn Syria.

Syrian refugees are not quite integrated into Turkish society yet. Many of them are unable to

participate in the workforce and depend on aid to survive. Those who do work mostly have low-

skilled jobs without official registration and insurance. The main reasons for this are skills gap,

language barrier and lack of connections.

Solution

An incubation center for refugees identifies and utilizes unrealized potential. Refugees are given

entrepreneurial training and networking opportunities so that they can start their own business.
